Pop Culture Grades K-2



Introduction

In this lesson, we will capitalize on the popularity and pop culture phenomenon of dinosaur movies such as *Jurassic Park*. Students will participate in discussion and then will write an opinion piece on the topic of reviving extinct species.

Learning Objectives

CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.W.2.1

- · Write opinion pieces in which they introduce the topic or book they are writing about
- State an opinion, supply reasons that support the opinion, use linking words (e.g., because, and, also) to connect opinion and reasons
- · Provide a concluding statement or section

Materials Needed

- · Clips from Jurassic Park (or any movies from that franchise)
- · Copies of graphic organizer
- Copies of rubric

Procedure

Warm-up – Show students a few clips from any of the *Jurassic Park* movies. Make sure you have carefully selected short clips that demonstrate the purpose of the movie without including any explicit language, violence, or gore.

- 1. Discuss the clips from the movie and talk about how the scientists in the movie found a way to bring back multiple dinosaur species. It is important, however, that you make sure students understand that this is fiction and could not happen in real life.
- 2. Show students some other species of animals that are extinct and discuss.
- 3. Have students complete the graphic organizer based on this question: Is bringing back an extinct species a good idea?
 - Choose a side: Scientists should try to bring back extinct species or Scientists should not try to bring back extinct species.

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Writing Prompt

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4. After students complete the graphic organizer, they should be given time to work on their writing assignment.

Evaluation

Have students use the rubric below to evaluate their own writing and/or their writing partner's writing. After they have used the rubric to improve their writing, use the same rubric to grade the assignment.
